Paul Bradford Crosby 1956-2024

Paul loved being outdoors. After graduating college, Paul returned to the outdoor agricultural work he loved. He completed a master's degree in forestry from the University of New Hampshire, then worked in forestry for Rockingham and Coos Counties before starting "Forest Management Services", which he ran for 10-plus years. In 2001, Paul and his family moved to Stoddard, where he was the Forester/Manager at Andorra Forest, including the Pitcher Mountain blueberries, for 21 years.


Throughout his career, Paul was devoted to conservation practices, sustainable forestry, and ecological understanding. He was a member of the Society of American Foresters and the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests, and served on the Cheshire County and Stoddard Conservation Commissions, Stoddard Planning Board and the Cooperative Extension Advisory Council.

Paul noticed the little things, particularly in the natural world, and enjoyed sharing with others about the woodlands and their inhabitants. He could often be found hiking the forests and mountains of New England or, on rare occasions, backpacking in the Rockies.

Paul's magnificent vegetable gardens were a source of nourishment for those he loved. Together, he and his wife Dorothy shared and bartered what they grew, offering the satisfaction and fruits of working the land to others. His love for sugaring and maple syrup led him to run a small sugarbush.

A music lover, Paul was an avid guitarist, playing often at the churches he served with wisdom and care. More recently, Paul sang bass with the a capella men's group Monadnock Blend and with the Keene Pops Choir. His love for music carried over to birdsong - he could identify many of New England's aviary residents by ear and loved to draw them to the attention of his companions. Paul's kind, loving, wise voice will be dearly missed.

## A LETTER FROM THE SELECTMEN

The board would first and foremost like to extend our deep gratitude to all the volunteers who stepped up to help during the storms in July. Individuals offered their homes, their equipment, their sweat and their time to get us through a tough couple of days. This is one of many things that make us proud to serve this community. Despite the financial impact of this storm, we have received some reimbursement from FEMA, but thanks to responsible fiscal management, this will not affect future property taxes.

Based on feedback after the storm, we have initiated a STODDARD ALERTS Mass Notification System. This will allow residents to register their phones, emails, landlines and other communication devices to receive information pertaining to emergencies and, if selected, cancellations and postponements. This system will ensure that information disseminated to the public is timely, accurate and consistent. Although Facebook is a useful tool, the town does not own the popular Stoddard Residents Page and information can, at times, be delayed or inaccurate. It is our hope that this new system will be a huge benefit and we encourage everyone to sign up. Please see the back of this report for more information on how to do that.

Other recommendations in this regard include the construction of shed that would support storage of emergency supplies, maintenance materials and other items
that support the health, welfare, safety and security of residents during an emergency. We also hope to expand on this concept by considering stockpiling resources needed for emergency road repairs. Understanding that natural disasters are not confined to our town, demand for resources can be challenging, and sometimes more expensive, when disaster strikes. Initiatives are underway to safeguard against shortages in resources and manpower during a crisis. We have also begun collecting data on local vendors, heavy
equipment operators and volunteers that would be willing to help during an emergency. If you have services or equipment you are willing to share, please email our Town Administrator for more information.

Other initiatives being recommended by the board include:

- An additional \$19,100 in the Solid Waste budget to fund the position of Attendant. The current attendant is an employee of Waste Management. By hiring our own personnel it is our hope that violations will decrease, thereby decreasing our overall disposal costs. We have also installed security cameras at the Transfer Station and are suggesting that fines for unauthorized use be approved at Town Meeting. We hope this will further deter illegal dumping and reduce costs considerably.
- Funding a stipend for a Road Agent. This position is currently filled, at no cost, by our acting Road Contractor. It is our intent that the Road Contractor concentrate primarily on getting work done, while engaging a dedicated individual to coordinate projects, elicit bids, prioritize work, spearhead long-term planning and respond to resident concerns. We foresee that this position will alleviate work from our contractor while providing an important contact point for resident concerns.
- A Warrant Article is recommended that funds the position of a Recreation Coordinator in response to public requests for more active recreational programs that serve every demographic in town. A survey revealed a strong desire for more structured recreational opportunities and this position will be responsible for developing programs and spaces that respond to community needs and desires.
- Some larger increases to our General Operating Budget this year include a new server at the Town Offices. This
initiative alone has increased our projected expenses by $\$ 20,000$. As our technology ages, we are required to maintain services and operations appropriate to our needs, making this upgrade unavoidable.
- An $\$ 8,000$ increase in this Budget is attributed to the purchase of a new Ballot Counting Machine, required by the State of NH . We are hoping for some reimbursement on this purchase. An additional election in this fiscal year also inflated our projected expenses.
○
Other increases in our General Operating Budget include some salary increases appropriate to time served, inflation and performance. There are also increases to mileage reimbursement rates as dictated by inflating federal reimbursement rates appropriate to costs incurred.

Policing has been discussed ardently over the past ten months in an effort to administer the service our community desires. Residents have expressed their preferences regarding expense and coverage during multiple public meetings on this subject. This issue will be discussed further during Town Meeting, and this Board is eager to support the decision of our voters.

The Board would like to take this opportunity to thank David Vaillancourt for his long service as our Police Chief. We wish him the best in his retirement from police service, but are happy that he will continue to serve the town in his role as our primary Road Contractor. We also want to thank Margo Santoro for her service as our long serving Animal Control Officer, as well as her Deputy, David Santoro. We wish them well in their future endeavors.

We welcome a couple of new employees to our Town. Rachel Smith has accepted the position on Animal Control Officer and Aisha Kahn began serving as our Assessing Clerk at the start of the fiscal year. We would also like to welcome our new volunteers who have graciously agreed to serve on various boards and commissions. The work that takes place through these groups is a cornerstone of municipal operations. We appreciate and respect all of your contributions.

Mostly, this board would like to you thank all of you, our residents, full or part-time, for allowing us to serve you this past year. It is an honor to be elected as your representatives and we will continue to endeavor to serve the best interests of all our constituents.

## CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In April 2021, three adjacent lots totaling 40 -acres of ecologically significant, undeveloped land with 4,000 feet of shoreline at the southern end of Highland Lake went on the market.

The Conservation Commission investigated what could be done to acquire, protect and manage this land for the benefit of the residents, JFES students, and camp owners on Highland Lake, and to preserve the land's outstanding wildlife habitat and other natural resource values.

In May, 2022, the Conservation Commission, with blessings from the BOS, obtained a signed Option Agreement (OA) from the landowner to purchase the property. It took 10 months of intense negotiations to obtain.

Key provisions of the OA included:

- A nonrefundable Option Fee of $\$ 25,000$, applicable to the purchase price, due at the execution of the OA;
- Raising or receiving commitments for $75 \%$ of the funds needed to purchase (and close) by December 1, 2022;
- With the successful completion of the two aforementioned requirements, the OA was extended to June 30, 2023; it
required a second nonrefundable $\$ 25,000$ payment, also applicable to the purchase price;
- The final deadline for compliance with the terms of the OA required that all funds required to purchase and close needed to be raised (or received commitments) on or before May 30, 2023!

As we entered the 2023 New Year, we had raised \$1,206,221 towards the fundraising goal of $\$ 1.5$ million (\$1.3 million purchase price; $\$ 100,000$ towards project costs; $\$ 100,000$ for a Stewardship Fund),


As the May 30th, 2023 deadline loomed, the fundraising goal was $\$ 92,000$ short of the $\$ 1.5$ million dollar goal.
In early April, 2023, with the help from Lynnette Batt, a regional manager with the Trust for Public Lands, a capstone grant requesting $\$ 92,000$ from an anonymous foundation was submitted by the chair of the conservation commission (with fingers crossed).

As a safety net, Article 24 was placed on the town warrant for "the Town to raise and appropriate $\$ 63,000$ in support of the purchase of Lot 125$021 \& 020$ and Lot 121-001 totaling 40 acres more or less (the Little Big Forest). It passed unanimously at the May 16th, 2023 Annual Town Meeting, with the promise to pay back the town by years end. Fortunately this appropriation was never needed!

5 months. We were not sure where this would come from! The following are some extraordinary examples of how the fundraising goal was achieved:

Two grants from the Bailey Foundation in November, 2022 and January of 2023 were critical in attracting the interest of 3 other "Friends of the Little Big Forest" where an $\$ 110,000$ match was created. This match became the incentive for private donations that provided another $\$ 110,000$ over the next 5 months.

A front page article in the February 18-19th, 2023 weekend edition of the Keene Sentinel increased public awareness of this exciting project.
On a drizzly, cold day on April 30th, 2023, JFES 3rd grader Jaxon Leonard organized a LBF fundraiser at the fire station. After 2 hours of selling hot dogs and other raffle items, he presented con com chair Geoff Jones with a paper bag containing $\$ 935$ dollars!

This amount was matched by the $\$ 110,000$ matching grant the 4 Friends of the LBF created. That resulted in doubling Jaxon's total to $\$ 1,870$.

A woman from Westmoreland, with friends in Stoddard, read the story about the LBF in the February Keene Sentinel that gathered her interest. When she saw an April FB post about Jaxon's stellar effort, she knew she HAD to become involved. She sent a check for $\$ 1,500$ to the LBF fund, citing Jaxon and the JFES's student's inspiring efforts. Her donation was matched, increasing it to $\$ 3,000$. When combined with Jaxon's fundraising effort, JFES students helped raise over $\$ 5,000$ (in 2022, 5th grader Mason Bodner raised $\$ 395$ from a JFES movie night and Olde Home days lemonade campaign).

In the next day's mail, the commission received a confirmation letter stating that the $\$ 92,000$ grant has been approved. The Philanthropic Advisor cited the James Faulkner Elementary School student's enthusiasm and involvement in the fundraiser as one of the reasons for the grant.

From the official signing of the Option Agreement by the landowner Mr. Wilson, on May 9th, 2022 to the May 15th, 2023 confirmation letter from an Anonymous Foundation in Maine, in a mere 12+ months, the Stoddard conservation commission raised $\$ 1,524,000$ million dollars, meeting all of the "impossible" deadlines and successfully closing on July 7, 2023 with the assistance of Tina Foster and Maine Street Title Services, LLC of Peterborough, NH. Land trusts, well versed in this process, usually plan on 24 to $30+$ months to raise and complete similar projects.
Funding came from the following:
USFS: In June, 2022, the Little Big Forest was awarded a $\$ 600,000$ from the USFS Community Forest Grant Program. The LBF was one of only 12 projects funded nationwide; of the 12 projects funded, it is one of only FIVE to receive the maximum amount of $\$ 600 \mathrm{~K}!$ !
N.H. Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP): On November 16, 2022 the LCHIP Board of Directors unanimously awarded the Little Big Forest a $\$ 400,000$ grant from LCHIP. It was the largest grant awarded in the 2023 round. (At the Sept. 2023 field review by the LCIP site team, I was told if "they" awarded points for passion, they would triple our score.........they must have awarded those points)!
NH State Conservation Committee Conservation Moose Plate Grant Program: On November 21, 2022 the Little Big

Forest project was awarded the full SCC 2023 grant award of $\$ 30,000$ !

Local Groups: The following local foundations and organizations contributed to the Little Big Forest:

- The Bailey Foundation (Three $\$ 20 \mathrm{~K}$ donations: 1 st on Nov. 22, 2022; 2nd on Jan. 13, 2023; and the 3rd on December 2023): Another $\$ 40,000$ is pledged in 2-\$20,000 installments in 2024);
- The Putnam Foundation on Nov. 3, 2022: \$25,000;
- Ashuelot River Hydro pledge in Dec. 8th Pledge: \$20,000;
- The Fidelity Charitable Fund Jan. 17, 2023: (Ariel Phillips and Gwyndaf Jones): \$5,000;
- The Lesser Foundation Nov. 22, 2022: \$3,000;
- The Keene Lions Club Oct. 11, 2022: \$1,000;
- The Highland Lake Unified Association Oct. 7, 2022: \$1,000;
- The Stone Ford Society Feb. 6, 2023: \$1,000;
- Anonymous Foundation in Maine: May 15, 2023 the capstone grant of $\$ 92,000$ !

Since the successful closing on July 7, 2023, a Stewardship Committee for the LBF has been established, consisting of 3 members from the conservation commission, 3 members from road associations that abut the LBF, a member from the Board of Selectmen, and a teacher from the James Faulkner Elementary School (JFES). The committee is chaired by Robert Winterbottom (an abutter to the LBF off of Walker Rd.). The Steering Committee meets the second Wednesday of each month. The public is welcomed to attend.

In the fall of 2023, the Steering Committee held 3 public listening sessions to solicit ideas for stewardship from the public; the JFES elementary school held a schoolwide listening session to gain input from the $60+$ students who will be an important stakeholder in the LBF. Ideas for stewardship will be integrated into a Community Management Plan that has been drafted and is being refined for submission to the USFS in January 2024, as part of the grant requirements.

At the December 13, 2023 Stewardship
 Committee meeting, JFES 5th grade

- To provide low-impact public access for various forms of recreational, educational, and scientific use where appropriate;
- To continue to inform Stoddard residents, town government officials, and the public at large, about the importance of a healthy, vibrant, and biologically diverse forest resource in the town and beyond.

June 5th, local artist Richard Whitney completed a landscape portrait of the LBF to be used to commemorate the effort to protect the LBF. Copies of prints and stationary can be ordered on the LBF website (see link below). All proceeds go to the LBF stewardship fund.

On June 7th, 2023, the nine members of the graduating JFES 5th grade class made history on their annual 2-day canoe trip on Highland Lake. They were the first JFES class to camp overnight at the LBF; the first of what we hope will be many. The trip was organized and led by Kroka Expeditions, from Marlow. Low impact camping techniques were used, in keeping with good stewardship practices.

A half-page article in the Keene Sentinel appeared in the June 8th, 2023 edition.

On August 19, 2023, a celebration of the town's ownership and fundraising effort was held at Lake Falls Lodge, hosted by Don and Joyce Healy. Close to 100 friends, town officials, and representatives from supporting agencies attended.

Two areas of encroachment were discovered during the boundary survey of 2022 that involved two abutting landowners. One encroachment was 0.15 acres; the other was 0.44 acres. Both were appraised separately from the conservation land, so it did not impede that transaction. Agreements were reached over the summer and fall of 2023 and payments for the land were made to the town. The Planning Board will hold (held) a hearing and approval at their January 2024 monthly meeting. The plan is to place the proceeds from the sale of the land involving the two
encroachments into the stewardship fund. This may require a vote at the 2024 Annual Town Meeting.
The conservation commission picked up two new members in 2023, welcome aboard Jaelynn Stetson and Aaron Bryer.

LBF Plans for 2024:
The Stewardship Committee and Conservation Commission have agreed to construct a $10+/$ car parking lot off of the Shedd Hill access entrance, where a kiosk, porta potty, and connecting trail will be located. The schedule for construction is in the spring/early summer of 2024.

As we enter the 2024 year, the stewardship fund has a robust $\$ 110,000$ in the bank, with another $\$ 40,000$ scheduled to be received from the Bailey Foundation in two separate $\$ 20 \mathrm{~K}$ installments in January and December of 2024.

It is important to note that not one cent of taxpayer money was used in the protection of the Little Big Forest: a promise made and kept!

To keep the stewardship fund flush, fundraising efforts will be on-going. We encourage all friends of the LBF who are inspired by our work to continue to make donations to the stewardship fund as they are so inclined.

## PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board is an elected board consisting of six Members and one Alternate; the Select Board designates one Select Board person as an ex-officio Member with power to vote. The responsibilities of the Planning Board are to prepare and administer land development regulations such as subdivision, lot line adjustments and site plan reviews. In 2023 we had one site plan review, one pre-application hearing, and an extensive review of a possible site plan compliance issue.

The Planning Board is also responsible for updating the Master Plan and this has been a main focus of the planning board. A town wide survey and public forum were conducted with, unfortunately, an extremely low response rate to the survey. We feel strongly that the vision for Stoddard is much larger than this board and needs community involvement and input from both seasonal and full-time residents. The Planning Board will conduct additional surveys focused on specific topics within the Master Plan during 2024 and work to receive stronger feedback from the residents. If you have any interest in assisting with the Master Plan efforts, please reach out to the Planning Board.

We would like to thank Chris Madden for his service as exofficio member for many years and Vickie Williams for serving in two roles as both Chair and Planning Secretary. This year we have seen the Planning Board gain new members. Bob Maden was elected to a one-year term, Rex Rodanas was appointed to a one-year term and Terri LaRoche joined as the new ex-officio representative from the Select Board.

3. Community recreational programs such as family game and movie nights and live music/entertainment
4. Establishing a summer camp for kids

These initiatives and programs will take time and experience to coordinate and communicate on an ongoing basis. Therefore, Town Meeting this year will include a proposal to create a town-funded position of "Recreation Coordinator".

This person would be responsible for creating, facilitating, and communicating recreational and social events and services via a website, email newsletter, social media, flyers, and/or banners on a regular basis. They will also be responsible for continued monitoring of public needs and desires in regards to recreational programing. This could include coordination with the Conservation Commission and other owners of local forests, this could involve applying for grants that enhance access to recreational opportunities, this could also involve working with the school to develop year round recreational opportunities that enhance students educational and social needs.

The coordinator position is likely to take on many forms and evolutions as the needs of the town become fully understood. The benefit of this position will making sure that there is a variety of activities here in Stoddard and that these activities, events, and services are known to the public.

## RECREATION PROPOSAL

At last year's town meeting, attendees voted in favor of retaining funds of over $\$ 11,000$ for the purpose of recreation. Now it is time to decide what to do with those funds.

In 2023, Inga Dellea created a public survey gauging interest in a variety of possible recreational activities and resources. After compiling over 100 responses, she found that there was the most significant interest in establishing a public beach/shoreline and a dedicated sledding hill. There was also significant interest in:


## ZBA

This report positions the role that the Stoddard Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) provides for the taxpayers of the Town, and reports on the organization and activities of this Board for this past 2023 calendar year.

The Stoddard ZBA parallels the role of all NH municipal ZBAs - to act as a quasi-judicial body to balance the rights of the individual property owner with the interests of all the citizenry as embodied in the regulations of the Town Community Planning Ordinance (CPO). In short, the role of the ZBA is to interpret the CPO and apply its intentions while recognizing an individual's right of usage of his/ her unique property.

The ZBA is considered a "land use board" under State statutes. It derives its powers from those statutes, specifically RSA 674:33 and 674:33-a, which together provide that a town ZBA has the authority to hear and decide appeals of individual property owners to specific regulations in the CPO. These appeals fall into four separate and distinct categories: (1) Appeal from Administrative Decision; (2) Approval of Special Exception; (3) Grant of Variance; and (4) Grant of Equitable Waivers of Dimensional Requirement.

A brief description of each of these appeals is at the end of this report*. Forms for each of these appeals for submittal to the Stoddard ZBA are available on the Town website: Boards and Committees $\gg$ Zoning Board of Adjustment $\gg$ Documents.

All meetings of the ZBA are public meetings. Unless specifically excluded by State Statute, all business of the ZBA is subject to open access via the State Right-to-Know-Law.. All appeals that are heard by the ZBA are publicly noticed in advance per State and Town protocols and include a public hearing seeking input from the applicant, abutters, and other interested parties.

Per State Statute, a ZBA is comprised of five full members, plus alternate members; the latter have the right to vote when sitting for member absences. At least three voting members (full members plus seated alternates) comprise a quorum to conduct the business of the ZBA. Importantly, a minimum of three members must concur for any appeal decision of the Board.

In Stoddard, ZBA members and alternates are appointed by the Selectmen. Currently the Stoddard ZBA has five full
members and two alternate members, listed below with their expiries:

- The full members are:
o Herb Healy, Chairperson (current term expires 2024);
o Franz Haase, Vice-Chairperson (2026);
o Jason Kovarik (2025);
o Doug Summerton (2026); and
o Bud Record (2025).
- The alternate members are:
o Milosh Bukovcan (2025).
o Loren Patten (2026)

Kathleen Ellis serves as the ZBA Secretary and is the "goto" person for applicants leading up to the public hearing. All the members appreciate and thank her for her diligent and timely work.

The Stoddard ZBA schedules regular meetings on the 3rd Thursday of each month at 7:30 PM at the Town Hall. Special meetings may be called for site visits or continuances, or other pending business with time constraints. These are in-person meetings, but an applicant, abutter, and/ or other interested party can request on-line participation by prior arrangement with the Secretary.

The procedures by which the Stoddard ZBA conducts its business are formally documented in the ZBA Procedures which are posted on the Town website.

During calendar year 2023, the Board met each month and heard 16 appeals consisting of 6 for variance and 10 for special exception representing a 4 -fold increase in appeals activity (the ZBA averaged 4 appeals per year over the previous 3 calendar years). Nine of the ten Special Exception appeals were to the Wetlands Ordinance (Article XII of the CPO ), reflecting recent Town compliance oversight and enforcement proceedings of waterfront property projects. The ZBA expects the recent level of appeals is indicative of activity going forward.

The budget for the current FY ending June 30, 2024 was $\$ 9775$. The ZBA budget is largely driven by the number of appeals we review and decide, primarily the costs for payroll, advertising (public notifications), postage, and legal services. Based on the recent appeals level, the requested budget for FY ending Jun 30, 2025 is $\$ 12,325$.

A note regarding legal services: while they are not linearly driven by number of appeals, the higher the number of unique cases the greater the likelihood for need of legal
advice. The ZBA makes use of the New Hampshire Municipal Association Legal Services, comprised of attorneys that are experts in State Statutes and NH judicial case law. This service is free to Boards and Committees of local municipalities, and while they will not provide legal advice with respect to a specific appeal of a specific Town Ordinance, they provide valuable guidance on interpretation of State Statutes and decisions of the State Supreme Court. We utilize these free services to the extent possible, supplemented by advice from our Town Counsel re specific appeals.

It is important to understand that the budget increase is not a net cost increase to the Town. The ZBA does not operate as an independent business unit; its budget does not reflect the income from fees that the ZBA collects from appeals by property owners. These fees cover certain costs for review of appeals as mandated by State Statute. The fees go to the Town Treasurer, not to the ZBA, and this
income is not reflected in the ZBA budget. The increase in the ZBA budget reflecting the increased number of appeals will be largely if not entirely off-set by those fees.

During this past year, the ZBA reviewed and adjusted its fee schedule for appeals per those State Statutes; these fees are posted on the ZBA website as follows:

- Fee for processing an application (appeal) -- \$75
- Fee for public notice (Keene Sentinel) -- \$75
- Fee for notification letters -- $\$ 8 /$ abutter, plus $\$ 8$ for applicant

The members of the ZBA appreciate and continue to utilize various training opportunities offered, especially the training provided by the NH Municipal Association. This training provides the members and alternates of the ZBA with valuable experience and expertise on a range of State Statutes and municipal case law from which we glean insight that is helpful to our roles and responsibilities.

Lastly, although we operate as an independent board we acknowledge and appreciate the role that the Conservation Commission serves for certain types of appeals, and the support of the Town Administrator, the Board of Selectmen, the Town Compliance Officer, and the Planning Board that together seek to execute the provisions of the CPO for the benefit and protection of the landowners and citizens of Stoddard.

* The following is a brief description of the four types of appeals, excerpted and revised from previous Town of Stoddard Annual Reports. Thank you to those previous authors. (Note: These descriptions have been parsed from several sources and rephrased. THE ACTUAL TOWN CPO IS WHAT WILL BE USED IN ANY APPEAL.)

APPEAL FROM AN ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION- If an applicant has been denied a building permit or is affected by some other decision regarding the administration of the CPO, and believes the decision was made in error under the provisions of the ordinance, the applicant may appeal the decision to the ZBA. The appeal will be granted if it is shown that the decision was made in error.

SPECIAL EXCEPTION- Certain sections of the CPO provide that a particular use of property in a particular zone will be permitted by special exception if specified conditions are met. The necessary conditions for each special exception are given in the ordinance. The appeal for a special exception will be granted if the applicant can show that the conditions stated in the ordinance are met.

VARIANCES- Under special circumstances, an applicant may apply to be granted relief from application of the strict terms of the Community Planning Ordinance (CPO). This may be a "use variance" which allows the applicant to establish a land use that is not permitted under the zoning ordinance, or an "area variance" which gives the applicant relief from a dimensional requirement for an otherwise permitted use. To grant this relief, it must be established that all five of the following conditions are met:

1. Granting the variance would not be contrary to the public interest;
2. The proposed use is not contrary to the spirit of the ordinance;
3. Granting the variance would do substantial justice;
4. The proposed use would not diminish surrounding property values; and 3. Denial of the variance would result in unnecessary hardship to the owner.

## EQUITABLE WAIVER OF DIMENSIONAL

 REQUIREMENTS- If an applicant discovers an existing dimensional nonconformity after the structure was substantially completed or after a vacant lot in violation had been transferred to a bona fide purchaser AND the nonconformity was caused by a good faith error in measurement or calculation, the applicant may appeal to the ZBA. If it is determined the nonconformity does not constitute a public or private nuisance nor diminish the value or interfere with future uses of other property in the area AND the cost of correction would far outweigh any public benefit to be gained, the ZBA may grant the waiver.

We continue to keep the Zeffy account open so anyone who still wants to donate to the new steps of the LBF project are welcome to do so.

This year has been a very busy one. In May of 2023, the town residents elected me, Karen Bell, as the Town Clerk/Tax Collector.

Stoddard has a great team of clerks! Deborah McGerty and Patricia Marotta continue to serve as assistant clerks. Notably, Deb's knowledge and expertise in tax collection have been especially helpful! Both Deb and Patty have multiple years of experience working in this office. This has made my transition back into my Town Clerk/Tax Collector role much smoother. I am very honored to work with such a competent, hard-working, and devoted team of clerks!

In March of 2023, Nancy McNeal was hired as an Assistant Town Clerk/Tax Collector. She exemplified the desire to serve our residents. Nancy came to us with a Bachelor's degree from the University of Hartford and decades of office management, customer service, and information technology experience. She also maintains a CPR/AED/First Aid certification. Upon my election to the Town Clerk/Tax Collector position in May 2023, Nancy was appointed as my Deputy. ## STODDARD FOOD PANTRY

In response to increased demand, the volunteers once again approached the Selectmen for help. They were looking for safe, clean and appropriate storage of food items, along with enough room to facilitate packing and delivering items to their clients.

Toward that end, the board approved spending on the Old Fire Station conference room. This included pouring a new floor, adding insulation and heat. This space will serve to add to the good works that volunteers are doing to help their fellow residents, as well as contribute to the value and maintenance of this underutilized structure.

The Selectmen wholeheartedly support the work of the dedicated individuals that are quick to act and follow through with real solutions for real problems.

## CEMETERY COMMISSION

The Town has six cemeteries (New and Old Dow Hill, Robb, Jefts, New Town, Stephens and Joslin) that are within the responsibilities of the Cemetery Commission. We make every effort to address issues and with the help of the Town residents can ensure that required maintenance (tree limbs, headstone repairs, etc.) is quickly identified. Plots Available

In the New Dow Hill cemetery, no plots were sold back to the town and 1 was purchased. At present there are a total of 27 plots available, compared to 28 plots available at the end of 2022 .

Grounds and Upkeep

The upkeep of the cemeteries has been performed in 2023 by Bob Curnutte and Michael Shawver. They have done an exceptional job in keeping the grounds looking great, even in the face of the July rain!

We would like to note that Bob Curnutte has decided that he will no longer work on the Cemetery grounds. We will miss Bob's dedication and the care he gave to the cemeteries over the years.

Additional Activities

While our primary focus has been on assisting burials and up-keep, we have continued to maintain our digitized records of available deeds, plot ownership, and burials, primarily focused on the New Dow Hill cemetery. In addition, we have updated the maps of Veteran gravesites, and taken pictures of all the Veteran headstones, for flag placement on Memorial Day.

## CONTOOCOOK \& NORTH BRANCH RIVERS LOCAL AdVISORY COMMITTEE (CNBRLAC)

The Contoocook \& North Branch Rivers Local Advisory Committee, (CNBRLAC) completed a productive year in 2023 with a full slate of meetings and monitoring activities for the Contoocook and North Branch River communities. The Committee met in person monthly at the Monadnock Paper Mills in Bennington and shared our meetings via Zoom.

Established in 1988, the CNBRLAC represents the fourteen communities that the rivers run through; Antrim, Bennington, Boscawen, Concord, Deering, Greenfield, Hancock, Henniker, Hillsborough, Hopkinton, Jaffrey, Peterborough, Rindge, and Stoddard. The CNBRLAC performs statutory duties including permit review and management plan coordination. The CNBRLAC provides a voice for the Contoocook and North Branch River towns and cities through the river's designation in the New Hampshire Rivers Management and Protection Program. The CNBRLAC updates the Contoocook and North Branch Rivers Corridor Management Plan (CNBRCMP) https://www4.des.state.nh.us/blogs/rivers/wp-content/uploads/ctc-plan.pdf and coordinates the activities in it. Work on an updated plan continued in 2023. The CNBRLAC website is www.cnbrlac.org. (As always, special thanks to river lover Luciano Lipari of Antrim for his volunteer creation and maintenance of our website).

This past year the CNBRLAC reviewed and commented on eighteen (18) proposed projects for Wetlands, Shorelands and Alteration of Terrain permit applications within the Contoocook and North Branch River's watersheds. There were a few major projects reviewed including a wetlands permit for the bridge proposed by NHDOT for the Jaffrey roundabout at Routes 124 and 202, work force housing projects in both Hillsborough and Peterborough and a mixeduse commercial project on Route 9 in Antrim. Smaller projects typically included improvements to homes/camps along several of the impounded lakes/ponds along the river. In general, CNBRLAC comments to NHDES included reducing or limiting additional impervious areas (pavement), encouraging natural existing shoreline vegetation as much as possible, enhancing shoreland areas with additional trees/plantings and encouraging low impact development (LID) infiltration techniques.

Representatives from the committee are regularly promoting the protection of the river and interests that the river supports. Several members are either current or past legislators who work within those roles to help the river and others are members of town boards such as Conservation Commissions.

The Volunteer River Assessment Program (VRAP) Monitoring Program marked its twenty-fifth year in 2023. It is meant to "promote awareness and education of maintaining water quality in New Hampshire's rivers and streams. VRAP coordinates a regular volunteer-driven water quality sampling program to assist NHDES in evaluating river water quality throughout the state." The VRAP Monitoring Program depends on the high-quality work of many of CNBRLAC's members and non-members each year who monitor river and stream health on the Contoocook and North Branch Rivers, and their tributaries at over ten sites between Rindge and Concord. During the summer, volunteers collect river water samples and record the results of in-field testing. The resulting data are used to evaluate the condition of the water quality of the rivers. The information is shared with NHDES, municipalities and their local officials, as well as to the State of New Hampshire and the US Congress. This data is available for viewing at Publications $\mid$ NH Department of Environmental Services (acsitefactory.com).

CNBRLAC's elected officers which include Matt Lundsted, Chairman; John Haley, Treasurer and Marco Philippon, Secretary were re-elected for 2023. Regrettably long time member John Haley has given up his role as Treasurer for 2024 as well as membership and will be severely missed but will hopefully continue to send us wildlife pictures from his new home.

Among other "retirees" from the Committee over the year, founding member Rod Zwirner of Antrim "retired" after 35 years of service. We would like to thank him for all of his work over the years both as a member of the Antrim Conservation Commission and the LAC. If we had one, we would award him with the CNBRLAC Lifetime Achievement Award- the CNBRLACLAA!

Despite multiple retirements, the LAC also added four new members from four different member communities.

The CNBRLAC work would not be possible without the generosity of all fourteen of its municipal supporters. Their support assures that the program has the resources that it needs to continue. Special thanks goes to Monadnock Paper Mills (MPM) as they provide the committee with an inperson monthly meeting space which provides for a consistent venue with convenient accommodations.

The CNBLAC meets monthly on every third Monday at 7:00 PM. ## LAKE HOST PROGRAM AT GRANITE LAKE

The Granite Lake Association completed its 22nd year of participation in the Lake Host Program, coordinated by the New Hampshire Lakes Association (NHLakes). New Hampshire had the wettest summer on record across all of June, July and August which resulted in a decreased number of hours at the boat ramp. Despite far fewer boaters, we saw the statewide number of suspicious specimens caught and removed before infesting a lake increase from 6 to 9 over last year. This increase is concerning and proves the value of this program.

The Lake Host Program works hard to keep New Hampshire lakes free from invasive species of both plant and animal life. Weekday volunteers and paid weekend employees staff public boat ramps across the state and offer free inspections of watercraft, looking for plant and animal matter that might be hiding on a boat. These inspectors also educate and inform boaters about the "Clean, Drain and Dry" messaging which has now become state law in New Hampshire.

In 2023 the Granite Lake boat ramp was staffed by 4 paid lake hosts and 17 volunteers who are trained in how to inspect boats. Each volunteer donates two hours of time every week. Our paid lake hosts logged 273 hours and our volunteers 239 hours, inspecting 392 arriving and departing boats. These numbers are lower than last year due only to the record amount of rain during the summer of 2023.

Our ability to maintain this program on Granite Lake over the past 22 years has been made possible by continued monetary support from the towns of Nelson and Stoddard. As always, we give all of our hosts and these towns a big thank you for helping us protect our beautiful lake.

## COMPLIANCE OFFICER

This past year proved to be another busy year for Building Permits. There were 64 approved permits with a total declared assessed value of $\$ 3,881,679$ to be added to the tax base.

A breakdown of the 64 permits were 9 new homes, 11 garages, 8 home additions, one commercial and 10 sheds. The other 25 additional permits to make up the total were for Solar Panels, docks, patios, carports, etc.

At this writing we have 3 pending violations in the Shedd Hill area and 2 of the 3 are pending in Superior Court. The third property is to be restored to its original status per the NH Shoreland mandate. There is one Shoreland Violation on Island Pond which is before the state at this time and could possibly include Stoddard ZBA involvement.

There is also one property in the Granite Lake area that has been issued a Cease \& Desist on a nonauthorized build. The issue will have to be resolved.

If your property is situated on the WATERFRONT, the NH Shoreland Act includes all land from the reference line (normal highwater mark) back 250 feet. Pproperty within 50 ft of the wetlands, or 50 ft from the reference line would involve Stoddard Zoning Board of Adjustment overview.

If you are planning a project, whether it involves the Shoreland Act or not, before proceeding do not hesitate to call me for information or a site visit. No one likes to be told what they can or cannot do with their property, however every town has rules and regulations and the Town of Stoddard is expanding rapidly with building projects and there has to be some degree of order. We should all consider ourselves fortunate to live in this beautiful little hamlet called Stoddard and let's work together to keep it that way.

## FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

Overall we had a very wet summer, so we were fortunate enough to not have many issues with brush fires. We did have an unusual brush fire on the island in the middle of Pioneer Lake that required several hours of mutual aid assistance from Nelson, Marlow, Gilsum, and Peterborough as well as a visit from Ranger Tyler Jefferson. This was due to the difficulty of accessing the island with the required equipment needed to put out the fire.

## It is very important to never leave fires unattended and to make sure they are completely out to prevent a rekindle.

Last year we issued a total of 184 burn permits compared to the 207 we did the previous year.

Here are some friendly reminders:

- All types of open fires require a permit. Seasonal permits for Cat I \& II fires require annual renewal each year.
- All new fire permit purchases require an inspection from the warden or one of the deputies. This includes all Category III permits that are required for burning brush. These are NOT available online, you must call to get one.
- All open fires must be always attended.
- Permits are not required in the winter if we have significant snow cover. Your burn area must be surrounded by 100 feet of snow.

We are here to educate the community so that we can enjoy the great outdoors so please don't hesitate to give us a call if you have any questions.

8 TIRES ARE ALLOWED PER YEAR - This is for car and light truck tires only. Please do not overflow the dumpster with items from other communities or businesses.

HOLIDAY CLOSINGS - if a holiday falls on the weekend and the facility is closed (such as Easter, Christmas, $4^{\text {th }}$ of July) it will be open the following Monday.

BE KIND - our attendants will work hard to make sure everyone has a chance to dispose of their waste in a safe and friendly facility.

## Article 01 Elections <br> To choose by ballot all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

## Article 02 CPO Amendment \#1 - ADU

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment \#1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Community Planning Ordinance (Zoning), Article 3, Section 3E to clarify the section on Accessory Dwelling Units and apply the ordinance to both new construction as well as the conversion of existing structures.

## Article 03 CPO Amendment \#2 - Non-Conforming Lots

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment \#2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Community Planning Ordinance (Zoning), Article VI - Non-Conforming Lots to remove subparagraphs 1 through 6 and reorganize the article.

Article 04 CPO Amendment \#3-Signs Permitted as Special Exception
Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment \#3 as proposed by the Stoddard Planning Board for the Community Planning Ordinance (Zoning), Article XIV, Section V, to allow signs in any district with a special exception.

FURTHER: you are hereby notified to meet at the James Faulkner Elementary School, Lucy B. Hill Community Room, in said Stoddard, on Tuesday, the twenty-first ( $21^{\text {st }}$ ) of May 2024 next, at seven of the clock in the evening (7:00 pm) to act upon articles five (5) through thirty-six (36).

## Article 05 Police Department

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 125,800.00$ for the operating budget of the Stoddard Police Department. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen 2-1.

## Article 06 Recreation

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 10,000$ for the purpose of funding the position of Recreation Coordinator. This position would be responsible for developing programing for all full and part-time residents, during all seasons. Funding will cover program costs and salary for the position. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 07 Operating Budget - Town Administration

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 728,992$ for general municipal operations. This article does not include special or individual articles addressed. Majority vote required. Recommended by Board of Selectmen.

## Article 08 Highways

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 307,300.00$ for winter and summer maintenance, emergencies, and planned repairs of Town roads and bridges. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 09 HIGHWAY SHED

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 40,000$ for the purpose of purchasing and constructing a shed on Town property off Rt. 123 N for the purpose of storing emergency management and highway supplies. Funds to be used from the unassigned fund balance and not raised by taxes. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 10 TRANSFER STATION VIOLATION FINES

Shall the Town vote to establish fines for the unauthorized use of the Transfer Station of up to $\$ 300$ for the first offense and $\$ 500$ for each additional offense within a calendar year as provided in RSA 149:M? Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 11 Solid Waste

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 292,400.00$ for all recycling, solid waste and related expenses for the ensuing year for the Stoddard Transfer Station, use of the Washington Transfer Station by certain residents and for hazardous waste disposal services provided by the City of Keene and Town of Washington. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

Article 12 Fire Department
To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 134,802.00$ for the operating budget of the Stoddard Fire \& Rescue Department. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 13 Ambulance

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 15,500.00$ for providing ambulance services and other related services. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 14 Emergency Management

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 11,500.00$ for the operating budget of Emergency Management. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 15 Cemetery CRF

To see if the town will vote to establish a Cemetery Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for unanticipated maintenance and/or expansion planning expenses and to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 2,500.00$ to be placed in this fund. Further, to name the Cemetery Commission and/or the Selectmen as agents to expend from said fund. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Majority vote required.

## Article 16 Cemeteries

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 18,590.00$ for the operating budget of the cemeteries. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 17 Conservation Commission

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 4,800.00$ for the operating budget of the Conservation Commission. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 18 Unexpended funds to Conservation Commission

To see if the town will vote to authorize the conservation commission to raise and appropriate $\$ 500$ to retain the unexpended portion of its 2022-2023 budget as authorized by RSA 36-A:5, said funds to be placed in the conservation fund account held by the municipal treasurer (RSA 41:29).

## Article 19 Lake Host Program

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 19,800.00$ for the Lay Monitoring, Lake Host Programs and water testing. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 20 Davis Public Library

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 53,205.00$ for the operation of the Davis Public Library. [Per RSA202-A:11, the funds raised and appropriated, other than payroll and utilities, shall be paid over to the Library Trustees pursuant to a payment schedule as agreed upon by the Library Trustees and the Selectmen.] Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

Article 21 Southwestern Community Services
To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 1,406.00$, for support of Southwestern Community Services. [Explanation: A non-profit agency which facilitates fuel assistance, weatherization and other related services to residents of Stoddard.] Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

Article 22100 Hundred Nights Shelter
To raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 1,250.00$, for the support of Hundred Nights, Inc. located in Keene, New Hampshire, for services provided to Stoddard residents. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 23 Home Healthcare

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 800$, to Home Healthcare, Hospice and Community Services to support the continuance of visiting nurse and home health services being provided to the residents of Stoddard. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 24 Monadnock Family Services

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 1,717.00$, for Monadnock Family Services, a non-profit agency which provides quality mental health services to residents of Stoddard, which is requesting said amount to help underwrite the cost of services provided to residents. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 25 Community Kitchen

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 973.00$, for support of The Community Kitchen, Inc., located in Keene, New Hampshire.` Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 26 Red Cross

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 1000$, for support of the New Hampshire Region of the American Red Cross. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 27 Stoddard Food Pantry

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 5,200$ for the purpose of funding the Stoddard Food Pantry. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 28 Tiny Tummies

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 2,000$ for the purpose of funding Tiny Tummies, a non-profit food bank that supplies resources to the Stoddard Food Pantry. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

Article 29 Community Volunteer Transportation
To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 500.00$ for the purpose of funding the Community Volunteer Transportation Company. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 30 Adopt/Modify Disabled Exemption

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 25,000$ to be added to the Fire/Rescue Vehicle Capital Reserve fund previously established. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Article 33 Emergency Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 10,000$ to be placed in the Emergency Capital Reserve Fund, previously established, for the purpose of funding unexpected losses or repairs to town buildings or equipment that require immediate attention and cost over $\$ 5,000$. Majority vote required. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

## Sign up to receive emergency alerts that could directly impact you and your family

The Town of Stoddard is able to send you emergency alerts via text message, email, pager, or voice mail (in extreme cases), based on your preferences. It is important that we collect this contact information to keep you informed with real-time emergency messaging.

The system is intended to be used for emergency alerts, as well as non-emergency incidents should you wish to opt into them. This system will not be used for routine information. In addition to receiving information on your wireless device, you may also receive notification on your land telephone line (if you have one) depending on the type of incident or event.

Please provide your address and preferred method(s) of contact. Adding your address will allow us to, if necessary, eliminate areas so you do not receive alerts that don't pertain to where you live.

These alerts are provided free of charge, however standard text messaging rates and other charges may apply. Contact information provided for this service will never be shared by the Town.
